





> (Hope Center #RealCollege 2021 Report)


02 CalFresh/SNAP Eligibility Rules Keep Students out of the Program

Covid-19 CA Student Survey Findings




Students who most often reported increased food expenses



Next Steps

Continue Working with State Legislative Leaders to identify policies that can be adopted this year and next year

Meet with Federal Leaders

to advance the Report's federal policy recommendations

Build Coalition With Other States

to pursue federal changes that eliminate college student barriers to accessing SNAP benefits.
