Disproportionate Access to Quality K-12 Education

- Overcrowded classrooms
- Racial disparity
- Fewer college prep courses




Community College Attendance

- 72% of Black undergrads attend California Community Colleges
- Only 3% transfer within 2 years; only 35% within 6 years
- High need for remedial math and English courses



Completion

- 66% of Black adults have attended college
- 34% of Black adults have an associates or bachelor's degree

Black Student Outreach Efforts Purpose



Purpose: The California Student Aid Commission recognizes the persistent equity gaps faced by Black students in California in both K-12 educational settings and higher education. As the state agency tasked with promoting and administering financial aid for all students in California, we want to address the disconnect between the services we offer and communities who could benefit from them, including Black students and families.




Black Student Outreach Efforts

Vision: All students deserve the opportunity to pursue higher education. Every student can be college bound, and we have the financial resources to help. We believe that students and professionals should work together to increase the access to information about financial aid to Black communities.

Commitment



Commitment: We are committing to expanding our existing programming to better serve Black students and their families. This means:

- Offering more workshops for families and students
- Reaching out to support existing community organizations such as youth groups, churches, and Black fraternities and sororities
- Developing specific messaging campaigns for Black families.




Black Student Outreach Roundtable

 - Discuss solutions to address racial disparity in the community

Black Student Outreach Roundtable




- Cultivate additional attention on parent and student voices within the community to get the message across
- Develop a list of financial aid talking points for community leaders to share
- Create and amplify distinct messaging for Black students and families
- Gain parental trust as it pertains to submitting documents for financial aid purposes (e.g., tax documents)
